MGATC Minutes: March 3, 2020, 6:30 p.m., TCEO

At 6:30 p.m., following the carry-in awards dinner, Mickey Penrod introduced the evening's speaker, Dr. Kim, Assistant Professor of Sustainable Horticulture Crop Production from Purdue. She gave a very interesting presentation, "Hydroponics and Aquaponics: Fascinating Way of Growing Fruits and Vegetables in Your House."

Dee Dee Long called the meeting to order at 7:26 p.m.

The February meeting minutes were approved as posted in the *Garden Beet* with one correction. The minutes showed approval was for the December meeting minutes instead of those for January.

Treasurer Pat Miller reported on a short, but exciting month. The account balance at the beginning of the month was \$20,503.18. Income of \$26,270.85 included a few more member dues, payments from vendors for the Garden Expo, and some miscellaneous items. MGATC received the anticipated payment from the WREC grant of \$25,568.17. This brings the Compost Project, where money had already been spent, up to \$12,017. Expenses of only \$36 from a bank fee brought the ending balance to \$46,738.03 of which \$23,205.92 is unrestricted and available. Savings remains at \$10,542.15.

Receiving \$25.50 from Amazon Smile was a nice surprise. It shows that many members are using the Smile program when making purchases at Amazon. Everyone is encouraged to do this.

NOTE: Many of the future meetings and activities announced at this meeting have been subsequently cancelled.

Dee Dee announced that sign up sheets for GAAP, the Great Annual Annual Planting, in May were located at the side desk. This program plants annuals at the IVH, Zoo, Art Museum, and Pedestrian Bridge. Dates and rain dates are indicted on the sign up sheets.

Cheryl McCool reminded everyone about the sign up sheets for the Garden Expo, our major fundraiser, April 25 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Plan to support the plant sale, garden shed, and café. There will be a potting party on Friday, April 3 from 6 to 9 p.m. at the extension office. Save boxes for customers to carry away their purchases and deliver them to the site on Friday, set-up day. Jeri Bosworth Parker explained to the group how to package and label items for the café. Cookies. bars, pies, kettle corn, and snack mixes are popular. Delivery should be from 3 to 6 p.m. on that same Friday.

Monique Fontaine mentioned that her email address in the Green Book is incorrect. It should be yfontain not yfontaine.

Kathryn Reeves would like more help with the Make and Take Workshop.

And don't forget about clean gardenrelated tools, magazines, and whatnots for the garden shed! All efforts to support the Garden Expo qualify as volunteer hours.

Karen Mitchell reminded everyone about the Lunch and Learn programs. The March 4 program has been cancelled. Space is limited for the rest. Notify Karen if interested. The Growing Through Leadership training was cancelled, but an alternate, twosession free class will be offered on March 30 and April 6 from 6 - 9. More information to follow.

Jan Sadler announced the sign-up sheets for Purdue Spring Fest on April 18.

Jan, Dee Dee, and Karen then awarded new badges to all members who hit volunteer hour milestones. Special recognition went to Monte Adams, Outstanding Rooky; Cheryl McCool, Outstanding Support Person; and Pat Miller, Outstanding Master Gardener.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:04.

MGATC Board: March 12, 2020, 6 p.m., TCEO

Dee Dee Long called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. In attendance were Jim Jeray, Pat Miller, Dee Dee Long, Jan Sadler, Maralee Hayworth, Mickey Penrod, and Cheryl McCool. Karen Mitchell attended by phone.

The January Board meeting minutes were approved as posted in the February *Garden Beet*. There was no Board meeting in February.

Pat Miller delivered the treasurer's report. Since the monthly meeting, there were two additions: \$35 from one Expo vendor and a \$7 donation to buy items for the raffle. No payments were made. Ending balance was \$46,780.03 of which \$23,240.92 was unrestricted. The savings remains at \$10,542.15.

A few more people have paid dues since the beginning of the year bringing the total membership to about the same as last year.

The question of offering honorary memberships to those who have been

Those eligible would pay dues at the same level and continue to receive the *Garden Beet* and Green Book under the same conditions as regular members. Questions about specific criteria to qualify, necessary changes to the by-laws and how other counties were handling this issue were tabled until the next meeting pending further research.

(The Children's Garden will be subdivided into smaller, manageable areas that will become individual gardens within the D&I Garden.)

Since Karen began using extension resources to produce the Green Book two years ago at no cost for printing and assembly, the Board agreed to provide the office with a proper stapler at a cost of \$80.

Due to fears over the coronavirus, the annual Garden Expo cannot be held at the fairgrounds on April 25. In addition, the March and April Saturday Pubic Workshops and the April Master Gardener Monthly Meeting are also cancelled. Karen agreed to send a blast email to all members with these details. With luck the Expo, our primary fundraiser, will be able to be postponed and modified to recoup some of the potential loss. The Expo committee will work out the details and report back with possibilities.

In other business, Mickey will work with a Girl Scout volunteer to build a pergola at the entrance to the Sunflower Room in the D&I Garden.

With no further business, Dee Dee Long adjourned the meeting at 6:40.

Gadgets and Garden Tools

Here's an update on an old saying: April showers bring May flowers ... and weeds.

The Missouri Botanical Garden notes: "Annual winter weeds germinate in the fall and winter and grow actively in spring. Gardeners are often surprised how quickly these weeds can seemingly pop up overnight in their yards and gardens, being unaware that they may have been growing slowly all winter long. After they flower in spring they die and disappear for the summer only to return in fall or winter \Rightarrow Sow or transplant outdoors when new seeds germinate. Some of the more common annual winter weeds in the Midwest are henbit, deadnettle, common chickweed, annual bluegrass, wild mustards, prickly lettuce, Persian speedwell, horseweed, cheatgrass, and rabbitfoot clover."

Weeding early and often helps gardeners stay ahead of the game. Definitely weed before these bad guys flower and set seed.

There are many tried and true tools for weeding. But just when you thought there couldn't possibly be another tool invented for weeding, there's a new kid in town: the updawg. It's new for gardeners, but is actually based on a very old seagoing tool called the mariner's updawg. Mariners used it to clear seaweed tangled in nets, anchors, and other gear. Sailors swore by it. Unlike the mariner's updawg that had brass and wooden parts, the modern updawg is hardened steel with an ergonomically designed plastic handle.

This great tool is so new to the market that you may have to search online for updawg. This tool should be available in stores on April 1st. Ask for it at your local garden center or hardware store. If they ask you "What's updawg?" You can answer, "Oh, nothing much, what's up with you?" And while you're at the store, ask if they can recycle a henway because when you use the old one it makes you groan.

April TO-DO List:

- \Rightarrow Start vegetable and herb seeds indoors - tomato, eggplant, cucumber, basil, and other warm season crops
- \Rightarrow Sow flowers seeds indoors marigolds, zinnias, and other quick annuals (check seed packet for those that need to be started 2-4 weeks before last frost)
- \Rightarrow Make sure seedlings have good air circulation indoors - use a small electric fan to make stems of seedlings stronger
- spinach, lettuce, salad greens, peas, radish, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, onions, leeks, chives, and other cool season crops
- \Rightarrow Lift and divide perennials
- \Rightarrow Add compost/organic matter to vegetables and flower beds
- \Rightarrow Remove winter mulch from strawberries and perennials
- \Rightarrow Prune the "3 D's" dead, damaged, diseased branches from trees, shrubs, and roses. Wait to prune maples until they start to bud out to avoid excessive sap running.
- \Rightarrow Don't prune oak trees during active growth from April through June to help avoid Oak Wilt disease.

Lemon Garlic Sauteed Cabbage

2 pounds white cabbage, core removed and shredded (10 cups)


- 11/2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive пil
- Pinch crushed red pepper flakes 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt or more to taste

Half of a lemon, cut into wedges

Heat the olive oil in a large skillet or Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add the cabbage, garlic, red pepper, flakes, and the salt. It might seem like too much cabbage for the pan, but as it cooks, the cabbage will wilt down.

Cook, stirring occasionally until the cabbage is tender and some of the cabbage begins to turn a light brown; 10 to 15 minutes. Squeeze the juice from 2 lemon wedges over the cabbage. Taste then adjust with more salt, pepper, and lemon juice as needed. Serves 4.1 serving equals 105 calories.



Pickled Beets

1 pound beets, about 2 bunches, greens removed and trimmed 1 large clove garlic, crushed 3/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

Place beets in a 3-quart saucepan and cover with cold water. Bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to medium low and simmer until the beets are tender and a fork inserted into the beets comes out easily: 40-55 minutes, depending on the size of the beets. Drain and cool beets until cool enough to handle.

Whisk garlic, oil, vinegar, and salt in a medium bowl. Peel and slice beets. Add to the dressing, and toss to coat. Cool beets completely in the dressing. Refrigerate or serve immediately. Yields 4 cups. 130 calories per cup.
