MGATC Meeting Minutes: March 5, 2024, TCEO

This month was the Annual Awards banquet to award Master Gardeners who have volunteered enough hours to receive their next level badges and to award special persons who have gone above and beyond in their efforts for the organization. The evening started with a social hour at 5:30PM, followed by a wonderful pitch-in dinner at 6PM. For dessert, vanilla ice cream was set out with many different toppings from which to choose.

At 6:50PM, after the meal, Sally Casey introduced the guest speaker, Stephen Swain, ATP, Rural Rehabilitation Specialist. Indiana AgrAbility /National AgrAbility and who serves at Purdue University in Agricultural Health and Safety. The title of Stephen's talk was 'Gardening as We Age and with Disabilities'. Stephen began the talk by giving the organization's historical background and how it has grown over the years across several states to provide resources mainly for farmers and others who have either become disabled or otherwise are having difficulty with doing even the simplest garden task or more demanding farming tasks. organization works with various agencies to help those in need find the correct resources that address their particular situation. His organization also provides on-site assessments, as well as training, education, and presentations, all of which are available to the public. Throughout his talk, Stephen gave a show-and-tell of various retro-fitted tools that help make a task physically easier. He also showed many tools and equipment readily available on the market for anyone to purchase. At the end of the talk, Stephen provided various pamphlet resources for people to take with them.

At 8:06PM, Cheryl McCool called the business meeting to order. A motion was made, seconded and carried to accept the February meeting minutes as published in the March Garden Beet without changes or corrections; however, a clarification was made regarding the \$2 entry fee into Garden Expo, which will be 18 years and older, while 17 and under will get in free (different ages had been proposed at the February monthly meeting versus at the board meeting). Pat Miller provided details of the treasurer's report.

Monique Fontaine reminded people to really get started on growing vegetables, herbs, and flowers for Expo, and to dig up anything from the yard to add to the sale, although be cognizant of anything that could be considered invasive or aggressive.

She stressed the importance of good plant labels with information on name, height, color, variety, etc. Clear labels with good information will help to sell the plants. Debbie Lewis reminded the group again about baking food items to sell. Please remember to save boxes for customers to use at the sale to carry out their purchases.

Cindy Gilles stated that the dates have been set for the upcoming the GAAP (Great Annual Annual Planting) days in May. There will be a mass email sent with a SignUp Genius link. Gardeners can sign up to plant annual flowers at the Columbian Park and Zoo, the Indiana Veteran's Home, the Art Museum of Greater Lafayette, the Vegetable Demonstration Garden, the John T. Meyers Pedestrian Bridge, and the Tippecanoe County Courthouse.

Cheryl informed the group on the board's decision to grant the Demonstration Garden Committee \$10,000

to get started on Phase 1 of their garden redesign project. (See the special board meeting minutes for more details on the discussion of the design). The committee has worked for several months of overhaul reimagining а complete Demonstration Garden. The new layout will be completed in three major phases over the next 3-5 years. Grant money is also being pursued for this project. The committee will be required to give the board monthly progress updates on the project. As these gardens are being redeveloped, this will be a good opportunity for master gardeners to get volunteer hours and be a part of a large beautification project in our Demonstration Garden.

With no further business, meeting was adjourned at 8:28PM.

Special MGATC Board for Demonstration Garden Proposal Minutes: March 4, 2024, 6:35pm, TCEO

The Meeting called to order at 6:35PM. members of the Demonstration Garden Committee. Dave Broughton, Courtney Frederick, and Georgia Brist, gave a presentation on the design layouts and proposals for the re-development of Demonstration Gardens. These gardens have become overrun with weeds and unwanted, old items and have not been productive gardens for a few years. Dave began by presenting the overall goals for the gardens, followed by Courtney who shared the illustrated drawings of the new layout as they will unfold in three phases in the next 3-5 years. Georgia presented the total financial cost, with itemized details from actual quotes. The total cost will be ~\$102,000, most of which will be supported by grants. The committee asked for seed money of \$10,000 to get started on major items for Phase 1.

Phase 1 will include initial cleanup of trash and removal of old items, followed by spraying of weeds and laying down new weed barrier for the new pathways. Beautification around the existing gazebo will be done, as that will be the entry focal point into the Demonstration Gardens. Also included in this

phase will be a new raised bed area for the grocery garden that is closest to the parking lot of the new animal shelter. The hoop house and its surrounding area will also receive extensive work in this phase, as well as putting in cover crops for areas to be developed in the next phases. Most of phase 1 was developed around working in the area closest to the parking lot first, as it will have the most exposure to the general public coming to the new animal shelter.

Phases 2 and 3 will fill out the remaining areas of the Demonstration Garden, having a theme around each garden area. For instance, one garden will demonstrate how to garden with disabilities, another garden will use mostly vertical structures to demonstrate vertical gardening, there will be a pollinator garden area, an area for a formal garden (like an English tea garden) and a quilt garden. There will be a deck and patio area built near the gazebo. Near the center of the gardens is planned Master Gardener Educational Pavilion, a sheltered area in which to hold meetings and workshops, and to provide a shady space for visitors to sit and relax. All of these gardens will continue to demonstrate various types of vegetable gardening. The designs were also built around much of the existing water lines. All of the plans allow for flexibility depending on costs, volunteer (continued on page 4) (Special MGATC Board meeting minutes continued from page 3)

help, any unexpected layout changes, etc.

There was much discussion on the financials, as this is a very ambitious project. While everyone agreed that the Demonstration Garden severely needs an overhaul and that this is a step in the right direction, there were many concerns about providing not only a huge lump sum up front, but that the total cost will also be hard to support in order to see the project through. (It should be noted that at last month's board meeting the group was informed that two grants were being written to help support this project which, if both are awarded, would add another \$25,000). Mickey Penrod made a motion that the committee should improve the budget by clarifying the expenses required for each phase and then come back to the table. This motion was not seconded. resulting in a failed motion. Dee Dee Long then stated that if the board did not approve the money, then the committee would not begin working in the garden. The committee will be having trash hauled off and weeds sprayed in April, which cost money, and needed to know if money would be approved to pay for it. Alison Roth then made a motion that was seconded by Jim Jeray to accept the Demonstration Garden committee's request to receive \$10,000 to get started, with the stipulation that monthly progress reports are presented at board meetings and to allow for additional money as determined by progress made. The motion was approved. The board thanked the committee for their very hard work. It is hoped that with the new design, there will be new enthusiasm for volunteers to join in and rebuild a new and beautiful Demonstration Garden.

The meeting adjourned at 7:47PM.

The meeting was called to order at 6:30PM by Cheryl McCool. A motion was made by Mickey, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the February board meeting as published in the March Garden Beet. Pat Miller provided an update on the financial statement. See her report in the Garden Beet for more details.

Pat Miller updated the group on the Tax Exempt certificates for businesses. An email will be sent to the group when more certificates are available and to check the MGATC website. Pat also announced that the summer bus trip will take place on June 20th.

Details of the itinerary will be announced in the future.

Cheryl announced that several MG members expressed an interest in an after Expo Party. This may take place at either the May or June monthly meeting. Details forthcoming.

Dee Dee asked for approval for signs (made of metal, 8 ½" x 11", \$13.25 each) to be made with the same logo and graphics that can be used at the various sites where master gardeners provide their services. This came as a request from the 5-Year Planning Committee, as a way to brand our group with more consistency. A motion was made by Cheryl, seconded and approved to spend \$132.50 for ten signs.

Dee Dee provided a brief update on the Demo Garden, stating that trash removal had started, but there were no financial updates as of yet. She also stated that we did not apply for the grants from the Community Foundation as the current phase of the Demo Garden does not fit the requirements. The committee will reconvene regarding next steps toward pursuing other grants, but in the meantime, work will still continue on the renovation of the Demo Garden. Pat Williams stated that he also did not get a grant for \$1,295 for a production garden for SNAP, etc.

Pat Williams informed everyone that the large, brown extension sign at the old extension office location is still there, lying on the ground and asked if we would want the frame to use for a new sign for our gardens. Pat was asked to get the dimensions of the frame, so the board could get quotes on a new master gardener sign and installation costs.

Pat Williams will be closing down the Education Center at the extension office and moving it out to the county branches of the Tippecanoe County Public Library, rebranding it as the Plant Clinic. The use of office space at the library branches is free. Pat said that people are not coming in to the education center and by putting it out in a more public location, that will better serve the purpose of master gardeners educating the public. The timing is still to be determined. Also, Pat will be developing a home-schooling program and will be looking to recruit master gardeners as education session presenters.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:04PM.

"Rainscaping is a combination of sustainable landscape design and management practices that prevents polluted runoff from reaching water bodies — directing stormwater to be absorbed by plants and soils. The Purdue Rainscaping Education Program provides training and resources on rainscaping practices that can be installed in residential settings or small-scale public spaces projects.

"The sessions include an introduction to Rainscaping (with site visit to Whitley County Rain Garden), site selection & analysis, plant selection & garden design, installation and maintenance, and we wrap up with a hands-on rain garden installation project.

"Program is offered by Purdue Extension and the Noble County Public Library. \$95 registration fee includes lunch and snacks both days, a PDF Participant Guide (or option to purchase hardcopy), a personal copy of the Blue Thumb Guide, and many more resources."

April Garden To-Do List

- Mark frost dates on calendar. https://www.weather.gov/ind/frostfreezedate The National Weather Service records last frost as late as May 27 or as early as March 30, the average is April 25.
- Grow some healthy happy plants for Garden Expo!
- VLift and divide perennials. Pot up extras for the MG Plant Sale.
- ▼ Start warm season vegetable and herb seeds indoors tomato, eggplant, cucumber, basil and others.
- Sow flower seeds indoors marigolds, zinnias and other quick annuals.
- Make sure seedlings have good air circulation indoors use a small electric fan to make stems of seedlings stronger.
- Sow or transplant cool season crops outdoors spinach, lettuce, salad greens, peas, radish, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, onions, leeks, chives and others.
- Add compost/organic matter to flower and vegetable beds.
- Remove winter mulch from strawberries and perennials.
- Prune the "3 D's" dead, damaged, diseased branches from trees, shrubs and roses. Wait to prune maples until they start to bud out to avoid excessive sap running.
- Don't prune oak trees during active growth from April through June to help avoid Oak Wilt disease.
- Wait to prune spring-blooming trees and shrubs until after their blooms are finished. Prune summer-flowering shrubs by early April.
- ▼Watch for spring bulbs to emerge. Pure joy.
