MGATC Meeting Minutes: July 11, 2023, 6:30 pm TCEO

The meeting was called to order by Co-President Mickey Penrod at 6:30 p.m.

Mickey Penrod inquired about the gardens of the members. One member, Georgia Brist, said she and her husband were in the process of assembling their new rain barrel. She indicated that they purchased the barrel for a very good price. The cost of \$82.00 included the barrel, diverter and stand. If other members are interested in a rain barrel, they can purchase this unit from Lafayette Renew which is located at the Water Works on Wabash Avenue.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the June 6, 2023 monthly meeting as printed in the July 2023 *Garden Beet*.

Deb Rimer gave the Treasurer's Report as follows: The total income for June was \$.34 in interest with expenses of \$2651.16 (which was primarily for insurance). The ending bank balance was \$39,552.19 with unrestricted funds totaling \$22,940.79. The savings account balance is \$10,556.73.

Cheryl McCool, a member of the Nominating Committee, reminded the members that we will be voting in December to elect new officers for the 2024-2025 terms. The commitment would be from January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025. Cochair officers are encouraged for the President and Vice President positions. Cheryl responded to questions regarding the duties of the officers, and additional details may be found in the MGATC Bylaws, Article V, Section 3-8, found on the MGATC website. One member expressed

interest at the meeting. Please consider volunteering for one of the positions. New officers can expect the full support of retiring officers, as well as any necessary training.

All volunteer spots have been filled for the Tippecanoe County Fair Master Gardener booth. Thank you.

An inquiry was made regarding the status of the compost project, and it was confirmed by Jim Jeray and Mickey Penrod that all was going well.

Mickey Penrod reported that by default, the Tippecanoe County Commissioners are going to renew the lease for our garden property at the old Extension Office through 12/31/2024.

Following the business portion of the meeting, Amanda Burge introduced our speaker for the evening. Dr. Krishna Nemali from Purdue University spoke on the topic of Home Hydroponics. He emphasized the benefits of extending our growing season, reducing waste and enjoying the fresh produce. Additionally, Dr. Nemali has obtained a grant, and has started the "Grow Kit Project." He and his team will provide training and all materials necessary to set up a home hydroponics system for 30-50 participants, free of charge. The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

MGATC Board Minutes: July 13, 2023 TCEO

The Board meeting was called to order at 6:34 p.m. by Co-President Jim Jeray. Board members present were Jim Jeray, Mickey Penrod, Jolaine Roberts and Cheryl McCool; Deb Rimer and Kathie Cox were present via Zoom. Dee Dee Long, Jan Sadler and Amanda Burge were absent from the meeting.

The June 8, 2023 Board minutes were approved as posted in the June 2023 *Garden Beet.*

The Treasurer's Report was given by Deb Rimer. There were no changes from the report given at the July 11 monthly meeting.

Jim Jeray mentioned that it was time for the Finance committee to start preparing information for planning of the 2024 budget. There was also a brief discussion about moving the Savings account so that our organization will have more flexibility

about how the money is used. The purpose for which the account was originally opened is no longer relevant.

Jim Jeray asked Deb Rimer about the Indiana Non-Profit Regulations and the report that we are required to file. Deb indicated that it had been very challenging to get our account activated, but once the account was set up, it was very easy to complete the required information. Deb also stated tax exempt forms, for MGATC tax exempt purchases, can be found on the MGATC website. Stores included are: Home Depot, Lowes, Bennett's, Rural King and Menards.

There was a rumor that the County Commissioners were unhappy that the Master Gardeners were unwilling to share water with contractors working at the old Extension location. This was investigated by Board members and it was determined to be unfounded.

Jim Jeray stated that the post office box has been cancelled. Any correspondence should be mailed to the Extension Office at 1950 S. 18th Street, Lafayette 47905.

Jim Jeray made a few updates to the 2024 Membership Form. This is a form that should be completed at the time that the 2024 dues are paid. Dues should be paid by December 31, 2023 in order insure inclusion in the 2024 membership book. Further information will be forthcoming about where to mail the completed form.

Member-at-large, Kathie Cox stated that she had not received any input from the membership since the last board meeting.

It was mentioned that member Doug Ketterer is considering becoming chair of the Chatham Square Community Gardens. He would like the opportunity to shadow Pat and Aubrey before making a decision. There are currently 30 plots with about 19 gardeners. It was noted that if we continue sponsorship of this garden, it may be appropriate to supply new equipment.

Pat Williams did not have any updates on the October State Conference other than currently speakers were being contacted.

The Board continued their discussion regarding equipment and shed needs at the garden. It was concluded that if we acquire any additional equipment, we will probably need another shed for storage.

Pat Williams said that some of the Class of 2022 have already completed their minimum required hours, and are now eligible to receive their Master Gardener badges. These interns have asked to have their badges now, rather than having to wait until 2024 when badges are normally awarded. After discussion, the Board agreed that it would be appropriate to order badges for those interns who had met their commitment.

There being no other business, a motion was made, seconded and carried to adjourn the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

Treasurer's Report

July 2023 Board Meeting Treasurer's Report

The income for June 2023 was \$.34 for checking account interest. Total Income Year-to-date 2023 is \$18.419.09.

For the unrestricted budget, we paid out a total of \$2,651.16: Demo garden \$55.04, Children's garden \$212.89, Memory garden \$155.90, Liability Insurance \$2087.00, and office (stamps) \$12.60. The Unrestricted Balance \$22,940.79 at the end of June 2023. Net Income (income-expenses) was \$10,681.06 including Restricted funds).

The Restricted funds expense was \$122: \$17 for the Compost Project- diesel fuel for the tractor and \$105 for Lawn and Shrub irrigation repair. The Restricted Fund Balance at the end of June was \$16,611.40. The Ending Checking account balance was \$39,552.19. Savings balance was \$10,556.73 and the new Gaming account was \$767.



JUL 26th, 9-11pm, Moth Ball, (NOTE: Outdoor Evening Program), WNC. Join Indiana moth-er Jeannette Jaskula for an evening celebrating moths in the woodlands of Tippecanoe County. Lights will be set to attract moths to a white sheet and moth bait will be spread on nearby trees to draw them in, as well. With over 2,300 species of moths recorded in our state, we are certain to find a dazzling and beautiful variety! Bring a flashlight and bug repellent. Limited to 25 participants.

AUG 2nd, 1-3pm, GO FISH!, TIPP BF. Fish biology and adaptation talk by Tippecanoe County Naturalist Mary Cutler will be followed by fishing on Burnett Creek. Come learn how fish are so much more than "what's for dinner!" (Rods, reels, & bait provided) Limited to 25 participants.

AUG 9th, 1-3pm, Granville Sand Barrens: A Growing Restoration, NICHES/GSB. Bob Easter (NICHES Stewardship Director) will provide an update on ongoing projects at this rare sand barrens property on this hike featuring rare species, unique wildlife and restoration techniques. He will also share plans for a large restoration/revitalization project on a new addition of 190 acres connecting this preserve to the Wabash River. Wear sturdy hiking shoes and bring bug repellent. 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Got extra produce? Donate it!

As part of the MGATC mission, Master Gardeners grow and donate thousands of pounds of fresh produce to food banks in the Greater Lafayette area.

If you have extra produce this summer, **Food Finders Food Bank Inc.** will distribute it back to our community!

Drop it by the 1210 N 10th St Warehouse in Lafayette between 7am-4pm from Monday through Friday. Enter Food Finders door on 10th Street - there's a counter on the right. If there's no one there, just leave produce on the counter (sometimes there's cart there for donated produce).

Other places to donate fresh produce are: **Lafayette Urban Ministry** (LUM) at St. John's Episcopal Church, 6th Street between North and Ferry, Lafayette TH mornings *and* at Unitarian Universalist Church, 333 Meridian St., West Lafayette, FRI mornings.



Great Gadgets and Tools

Heavy duty plastic tubs, trugs or "tubtrugs" (shown below) are great for weeding, deadheading, and mulching. Look for food grade tubs for harvesting.





August Garden To-Do List

Water in drought conditions. Keep watering newly planted perennials, shrubs and trees, and well-established trees and shrubs too. Conifers do not wilt; they just die if there isn't sufficient water. Arborvitae are especially susceptible to dying in drought.

It's hot and your garden may be looking tired. Weed, trim, deadhead, edge, mulch, water and remove debris to keep things looking fresh.

**Keep compost pile "cooking" with adequate moisture.

Pick veg like tomatoes, peppers, beans and squash to keep plants producing.

*Watch for tomato hornworms – handpick and destroy unless they're covered with white eggs of parasitic wasps that will hatch and naturally kill the hornworms for you. Handpick Colorado potato beetles and squash bugs.

Melon and corn crops may start to ripen this month.

Cure potatoes, onions, and garlic after harvest before storing.

Start fall veg planting by transplanting broccoli, pak choi, kohlrabi and kale or direct sow root and leaf crops.

🥦 Sow cover crops on bare areas in veg garden.

Start taking cuttings of favorite garden plants to root and overwinter indoors.

🏂 Don't fertilize woody plants this month.

Prune and destroy branches infested with fall webworms and tent caterpillars. Hand prune bagworms.


Early August lawn care: if white grubs are causing damage, apply insecticide and irrigate.

More August lawn care: water during dry spells or allow lawn to go dormant. Wait to fertilize until September.

Think about garden areas that need improvement. Plan to buy or order perennials, shrubs and trees for fall planting.
