Easy Broccoli-Cheddar Quiche

Ingredients:

1 (9 inch) frozen whole-wheat piecrust shell

1 (8 ounce) package microwavable fresh broccoli florets

11/2 teaspoons olive oil

1 cup chopped sweet onion (from 1 large onion)

4 large eggs

1/2 cup evaporated milk3 ounces sharp Cheddar cheese, shredded (about 3/4 cup)3/4 teaspoon kosher salt1/4 teaspoon ground pepper

Directions:

- Step 1. Preheat oven to 400°F. Let pie crust thaw at room temperature for 10 minutes. Bake until lightly browned, 10 to 15 minutes. Let cool slightly, about 10 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 375°.
- Step 2. Meanwhile, cook broccoli according to package directions until tender-crisp, about 3 minutes. Coarsely chop any larger pieces.
- Step 3. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onion and cook until light golden, 8 to 10 minutes.
- Step 4. Whisk together eggs and evaporated milk in a medium bowl. Stir in the broccoli and onion along with cheese, salt and pepper. Pour the mixture into the cooled crust.
- Step 5. Bake until the center is just set and the edges are golden brown, 30 to 35 minutes. Let stand for 10 minutes before serving.

Treasurer's Report

Income for the month of October was from dues and interest for a total of \$842. Expenses for the month were for the shed move, Garden Expo 2022, compost project, and the Demo and Display & Idea Gardens for a total of \$1,167. There were charges to the Compost Project and the addition of 2022 dues which changed the restricted funds giving a balance of \$16,483. The total of unrestricted funds available is \$13,785 as of October 31. DUES: It is now time to renew your membership in the MGATC for 2022. The dues remain the same as 2021 with single membership at \$25, couples membership at \$40, the Green Book is \$2, and the *Garden Beet* by US mail is \$12. MGATC Board, Nov 11, 2021, 4 p.m., Virtual

Dee Dee Long called the meeting to order at 4:01 p.m. Attending were Pat Miller, Dee Dee Long, Jim Jeray, Jan Sadler, Nancy Cope, Mickey Penrod, Maralee Hayworth, Jolaine Roberts, Karen Mitchell, and Katje Armentrout.

Minutes from the October meeting were approved as published in the *Garden Beet*.

Pat Miller delivered the treasurer's report. Since the end-of-month report, she received \$605.77 in dues and paid out \$304.50 for signs for the compost area and the Display & Idea Gardens.

2022 Budget: Pat then reviewed in detail the proposed budget from the finance committee for the coming year. The budget has two scenarios in the unlikely event of the cancellation of the Garden Expo again. The board will vote to approve the budget at the December meeting.

Membership: Dues for 2022 continue to come in with 57 members signed up so far. Next month Pat will put together a spreadsheet with contact information of current members not yet responding plus those who recently dropped out for the board members to contact. (There is good evidence that the pandemic/lockdown discouraged some former members from rejoining last year.)

Garden Expo: Preliminary plans are beginning for the Expo in April: the deposit to reserve the West Pavilion was sent in; tables and chairs will be available as in years past; Pat is applying for the nursery license; and Katje will locate the lawn signs or furnish new ones. Separate Expo meetings will begin in December.

Security/Alarm System: The board voted to let the alarm system agreement expire at the end of the current term and instead use additional physical security on the sheds.

Garden and Parking Lease Agreements: The board received and reviewed the formal contracts from the county to lease to MGATC the land for the gardens behind the current extension office with provisions for some adjacent parking. There is a need for clarification in a few areas: inconsistent description of the term of the leases, number of parking spaces allocated, liability, reassignment of the leases, and parking lot use for the portable toilet. Katje will set up a meeting with the commissioners to finalize details.

New Officer Nominations: Cheryl McCool will run for the remaining co-vice president position. Dee Dee Long will post the slate of officers in the *Garden Beet*. The vote will take place at the December monthly meeting.

Sheds and Storage: The sheds are full and the brown shed behind the office still has many miscellaneous items to be moved out. Most of it is of low value and is being saved for sale at the Expo. Jim will contact Candace Sheagley who traditionally runs the sale so that she can provide experienced input into what should be saved and what should be thrown away. The rest will be stored under tarps in the pergolas in the community gardens until closer to the Expo time. Alumni Members: The bylaws must be updated to follow the recently published Purdue program rules. Jim Jeray will recommend changes to Article II, Section 1, Paragraph C. Alumni members must still pay for a Green Book and/or mailed *Garden Beet* if desired.

Extension Move Update: The move is now scheduled for the middle of January. Katje will set up a building tour for the board as it becomes possible. Our first inperson monthly meeting will not be before March.

New Extension Agriculture and Natural Resources Educator: Pat Williams has a Ph.D. in horticulture and many years of experience working with county extensions in about 10 different states. He will be our primary support person at the extension office and is excited to start working beginning on December 1.

With no further business the meeting adjourned at 6:03 p.m.

If you want to improve your soil and don't already have a compost bin, ask Santa for one or two or three. There are small indoor composters for apartment dwellers, large ones for those with outdoor space, wire bins, enclosed bins, and rotating compost bins.

To make collecting kitchen veg scraps easier and reduce trips out to the compost pile, Gardeners Supply Company <u>http://www.</u> <u>gardeners.com</u> has a stylish selection of countertop compost pails and crocks with airtight lids. Some designs include odor eliminating carbon filters.

A good sturdy garden fork helps with turning and aerating your compost pile and, in our opinion, works better than a standard pitchfork.

Another useful tool is a compost/ mulch/manure fork - these are slightly scoop or basket shaped, have more tines and are wider than a garden fork or pitchfork. The long, slender, closely spaced tines of this kind of fork are particularly suited for transferring awkward loose materials like compost, mulch, manure, straw, hay, or wood chips. Some are light duty; some are stronger for heavier loads. A. M. Leonard https://www.amleo.com has a selection of 6, 8, and 10 tine forks. A few are made of weatherproof poly so you could leave it outside right by the compost pile to save time.

From the practical to the purely joyful, there are so many gifts perfect for gardeners. Terrain <u>http://</u> <u>www.shopterrain.com</u> has a range of glass Christmas tree ornaments representing vegetables, fruit, flowers, birds, honeycomb, and bees.

Don't forget to buy spring bulbs. Plant them when the soil temperature is 55 degrees or cooler, but before the ground is frozen.

DECEMBER TO-DO LIST:

- Continue to apply animal repellent over spring bulbs such as tulips and crocus and on trees, shrubs, and evergreens.
- ☑ Store fragile pots before freezing weather. Frost-proof pots can stay outside during winter.
- Create seasonal displays in pots and planters with colorful stems, boxwood and evergreen cuttings.
- Start forcing hardy bulbs like tulips, daffodils, hyacinth, grape hyacinth, crocus, and others for indoor blooms.
- Mulch tender perennial plants and provide winter protection for roses when plants are dormant, temperatures are cold, and the ground has frozen.
- Winterize mower and all power tools. Run them to use up remaining fuel or add a fuel conditioner.
- ☑ Leave some perennial foliage standing for winter interest birds will feed on the seed heads. Cut back less decorative perennials after a frost, leaving 3-6" to protect the crown of the plant.

Don't cut down perennials with hollow stems, as they are especially prone to rotting in a wet winter.

- ☑ Clean birdhouses and fill bird feeders.
- Mark your calendars for the First Day Hike at Prophetstown State Park and all Indiana State Parks on Jan. 1st.
