MGATC Meeting Minutes: November 7, 2023, 6:30 pm

The meeting was called to order by Co-President Mickey Penrod at 6:35 p.m.

A correction was made to the October 3, 2023 minutes. Alison Roth's presentation was on the Master Gardener "Vineyard." A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the October 3, 2023, monthly meeting with the noted correction.

Sue Swick questioned the statement in the October Board minutes regarding "we will not accept donated plants from persons who are not Master Gardeners as we do not know what we are getting." She asked if that meant she could not donate plants if she decided not to rejoin MGATC. Since she is a Master Gardener and we know her plants, she can continue to donate plants. This statement will be clarified at the November Board meeting.

Deb Rimer gave the Treasurer's Report. She reported that the ending bank balance was \$35,240.91, with unrestricted funds in the amount of \$18,579.47. Restricted funds totaled \$16,661.44; the savings account balance was \$10,557.53; and, the gaming account balance was \$767.00.

Jim Jeray announced that the January 2024 meeting will be held on January 9 instead of January 2. The room has been reserved for the meeting.

In regard to some members not receiving mass emails, those members should check their junk mail folder to see if they are being delivered there.

The Finance Committee met last week to prepare the 2024 budget, which will be presented to the Board at the November 9 meeting. The budget will be edited to include any changes made by the Board and will be submitted for final review and approval at the December meeting.

Mickey Penrod announced that the MGATC placed 3rd in the AAS National Competition. She noted that there was interest from the new class to work in the AAS garden; however, no one has shown any interest in taking over as Chair. If no one steps up, we will not have the AAS Garden next year.

Pat Williams presented Aaron Hazzard with his Certified Master Gardener badge and certificate.

Pat Williams asked all members to get their hours entered by December 31 and their annual agreements updated as well. Anyone who has not done so will no longer be a Master Gardener.

Sue Hiser brought two spider plants for anyone interested in them. The plants were placed just outside the entrance door.

Mickey Penrod noted that the MGATC will be purchasing a used lawn mower from Mary Kay McCauley.

There being no further agenda items, the business portion of the meeting adjourned at 6:45 p.m.

Co-Vice President Cheryl McCool then introduced the evening's speaker, John Orick who is the Purdue EMG State Coordinator. He gave a very interesting slide presentation overview on "Rainscaping for the Home Landscape." The presentation also included website resources. He also said that Purdue has a 2-day education program on rainscaping. Details can be found on their website.

The education portion of the meeting adjourned at 7:48 p.m.

MGATC Board Minutes: November 9, 2023 TCEO

The Board meeting was called to order by Co-President Mickey Penrod at 6:30 p.m. Board members present were Jim Jeray, Mickey Penrod, Cheryl McCool, Jan Sadler, Jolaine Roberts, and Dee Dee Long. Deb Rimer and Kathie Cox were present via zoom. Pat Miller was also present as noted. Amanda Burge was absent from the meeting.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the October 3, 2023, Board meeting as posted in the November *Garden Beet*.

To clarify the question about plants for Garden Expo, our reputation is riding directly on the plants we sell so all of the plants at our plant sale must be healthy.

No plants can be stressed or diseased. Quality control is very important. For that reason, we will only accept for the sale to the public plants from current and alumni Master Gardeners, but we would accept other plants donated to the MGATC for use in our gardens.

Deb Rimer gave the Treasurer's Report. The ending bank balance for October was \$35,240.91, with unrestricted funds totaling \$18,579.47. There were no changes from the report given at the monthly meeting on November 7.

Jim Jeray reviewed the 2024 Budget prepared by the Finance Committee line by line. The Board discussed the budget and made a few changes. The budget will go back to the Finance Committee and Deb Rimer will make the changes. It will then be submitted to the MGATC for approval at the December meeting.

Pat Miller left the meeting.

Doug Ketterer has agreed to chair the Chatham Square Community Gardens. The Chatham gardens are in desperate need of soil. Doug would like to obtain three loads of soil from Soilmakers yet this year at a cost of approximately \$2,000. It was noted that there is \$600 remaining in this year's budget which would pay for one load. A motion was made, seconded and approved for \$1,500 from the Chatham Square restricted fund be used to obtain the other two requested loads of soil per Doug Ketterer's request.

In regard to MGATC pens, Jan Sadler reported that there are still plenty of the pens which were ordered to give out at the fair and other booths. A motion was made, seconded and carried to purchase 200 more of the nice pens for our Master Gardeners recognition (with black ink).

Pat Williams reported that he will be finished determining interest areas for the current class in

order to set up the Vine and Trellis program which will set up new class members working with experienced master gardeners.

Mickey Penrod noted that MGATC is purchasing a used lawn mower from Mary Kay McCauley at a cost of \$150.

Dee Dee Long will remind Pat Miller to obtain the nursery license needed for the 2024 Garden Expo.

Jim Jeray reported that Guido Nizzi is in the process of winterizing all MGATC equipment.

Jim Jeray also reported that we have had numerous problems with Lawn & Shrub in regard to our irrigation system at the Extension Gardens. The plan is to search for an alternative to replace them. However, Mickey Penrod said that this search should be put on hold until we see what damage, if any, has been done with the construction being done at this site. If there is significant damage from the construction, we will need to contact either the Commissioners or Tecton.

Pat Williams stated that our Master Gardeners need to get their hours posted. At this point, 49 members have reported very few or no 2023 hours. He will send out a mass email to everyone noting that if they do not get hours in by December 31, they are no longer a master gardener.

In addition, Dee Dee Long will send a mass email asking Master Gardeners if they plan to renew their membership for 2024 and asking that they respond to her if they do not plan to renew their membership.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 7:46 p.m.

The income for October 2023 was \$.30 for checking account interest. Total Income Year-to-date 2023 is \$17,495.32.

For the unrestricted budget, we paid out \$320.70 for Social Committee reimbursements for Hoe Down, Trunk or Treat, and MG Class snacks. Total expense for the year was \$10,707.93. Net Income for the year is \$6,787.39. The Unrestricted Balance was \$18,579.47 at the end of October 2023.

The Restricted funds expense was \$178.18 for the Compost project tractor diesel/oil. The Restricted Fund Balance at the end of month was \$16,661.44. The Ending Checking account balance was \$35,240.91. Savings balance was \$10,557.53 and the new Gaming account was \$767.00.

December Garden To-Do List

A Spring bulbs can still be planted this month before the ground is frozen.

A Create seasonal displays in pots and planters with colorful stems, boxwood and evergreen cuttings.

A Continue to apply animal repellent over spring bulbs such as tulips and crocus and on trees, shrubs, and evergreens.

A Store fragile pots before freezing weather. Frost-proof pots can stay outside during winter.

A Start forcing hardy bulbs like tulips, daffodils, hyacinth, grape hyacinth, crocus and others for indoor blooms.

A Prune trees in fall and early winter to remove dead or weak branches.

Clean birdhouses and fill bird feeders.

A Mulch tender perennial plants. Provide winter protection for roses when plants are dormant, temperatures are cold and ground has frozen.


Ninterize mower and all power tools. Run them to use up remaining fuel or add a fuel conditioner.

Leave some perennial foliage standing for winter interest - birds will feed on the seed heads. Cut back less decorative perennials after a frost, leaving 3-6" to protect the crown of the plant. To prevent rot, don't cut back those with hollow stems until spring.
