MGATC Meeting Minutes: April 2, 2024, TCEO

Cheryl McCool called the business meeting to order at 6:43PM. A motion was made by Mickey Penrod to approve the minutes in the April Garden Beet without changes or corrections. Motion was seconded and carried.

Pat Miller gave the financial report. See the details of her report in the Garden Beet. Cheryl then asked for each Garden Expo committee person to give an update on their respective areas. Debbie Lewis reminded everyone to use either snack bags for small items (for example, one cup of snack mix) or sandwich bags for anything larger. Courtney Frederick asked more donations for the Raffle of the gift baskets to raise money for scholarships. Since Expo is happening closer to Mother's Day, a good idea is to make a Mother's Day basket full of garden items, or even items for a tea. Courtney and Pat Miller were also taking cash donations towards basket items for those not able to shop.

Monique Fontaine brought extra plant tags and ideas for home-made plant tags for the Expo plant sale. A good tag will sell the plants faster. She even suggested using colorful tags that match the color of the bloom of the plant. She brought a show and tell of various kinds of plants she had potted up from her yard, including both moss and just a few small pips of Lily-of-the-Valley. Plants dug up from yards do not have to be put in large pots, 4 - 6 inches will do, but good tags with descriptions are a must.

All items for Expo are to be dropped off between 3-6PM, Friday, April 26th at the fairgrounds, or 7-9AM on Saturday morning before Expo opens to the public. This includes Garden Shed items (gently used tools, garden décor, garden books, etc), all plants for the sale, and baked goods for the bake sale. It was advised to bring tender plants on Saturday morning, as the temperature in the building is not controlled overnight.

Silent auction items were on display at the meeting and will also be put on display at the Expo. Dee Dee Long requested that people look at the Sign-Up Genius list of volunteer slots, as there are several that still need to be filled. This is our biggest fundraiser of the year and it takes everyone to make it a success. If you are volunteering at Expo, be sure to check in at the entrance at the desk where Dee Dee Long and Cheryl McCool will be located to get a green bandana to wear while working. bandana can be worn on your head, around your neck or arm, through a beltloop, etc, just so that it is visible to the patrons to ask for help if needed. It is also very important to wear your master gardener badge so you will not be charged admission when showing up to volunteer.

Cindy Gilles gave an update on the upcoming GAAP plantings. There are still some open positions at some of the locations. The Sign-Up Genius email will be resent, so please take a look and volunteer if you are able. The individuals overseeing the community gardens updated the status of how many community gardeners have signed up. As of this meeting, Chatham Square was full, West Side had four gardens left to rent, and nine open gardens were at the community gardens by the old extension office. Individuals can still contact the extension office and be put on a waiting list if needed.

Pat Williams handed out next level badges to individuals who were not able to attend last month's awards banquet. Congratulations to those individuals! See last month's Garden Beet for full list of individual badge and award winners.

Chad Evans, chief meteorologist from WLFI TV 18, was originally scheduled to be our guest speaker, but due to unforeseen circumstances, was not able to attend. Instead, Dr. Pat Williams, ANR Educator

and Master Gardener County Coordinator, gave a talk he recently presented at the White County SWCD meeting on Wildlife and Invasive Species. Pat provided a more philosophical take on native versus invasive (which could be plant, animal, insect, etc). Throughout the talk he asked several questions, such as: Does this actually work (when removing invasives), Do we have any native soils left in which to plant native plants, What does success look like, What happens if we do nothing? He also presented several facts and figures, and especially interesting was the invasive curve, which illustrates

four levels of the invasive cycle: prevention, eradication, containment, and long-term management. If an invasive is not caught early, then by the containment and long-term management phase, it's here to stay and may end up costing millions to manage it.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:54PM.

MGATC Board Minutes: April 11, 2024, 6:30pm, TCEO

Attendees: Jim Jeray, Pat Miller, Alison Roth, Dee Dee Long, Cheryl McCool, Mary Kay McCauley, Kathie Cox, Sally Casey, Georgia Brist, and Pat Williams. Absent: Mickey Penrod.

The meeting was called to order at 6:31PM by Cheryl McCool. A motion was made by Dee Dee, seconded and carried to approve the minutes of the March board meeting as published in the April Garden Beet.

Pat Miller provided an update on the financial statement. Main income is from member dues, Expo vendor fees, and interest. New this month were expenses for Expo, but expenses for the Demonstration Garden will not begin to show until next month. See her full report in the Garden Beet for more details. Pat also announced that the summer bus trip on June 20th has seventeen master gardeners and one guest signed up so far. The email will be resent for the sign-up. The deadline to pay for the trip is May 19th (\$57 for members, \$72 for guests). The bill to pay for the bus rental is May 21st.

Dee Dee provided updates on a variety of topics, as follows. The car caravan trip to Woldhuis Farms Sunrise Greenhouse in Illinois will be on Friday, May 3rd, leaving from the West Lafayette Meijer at 9AM. The Outdoor Explore event will be held at the Tippecanoe County Amphitheater and Nature Area on June 8th. We will have a booth display for this event, with a theme of native plants. Dee Dee verified the time and place of our board retreat, to be held in the Vinton Room of the Northside Community Center at 9AM on Saturday, June 1st. There will be an After Expo Party at our May monthly master gardener meeting to say thank you to all who volunteered in any capacity to make Expo a success, using the ice cream items left over from

the March meeting. Dee Dee then provided a brief update on the Demo Garden, sharing a spreadsheet of expenses to date (these will show up on next month's financial report). Nine raised beds of various sizes have been ordered. The garden will be sprayed sometime on or after April 17th, weather dependent. Courtney Frederick will then layout the pathways so the other team members can begin building/planting in certain areas.

For the Expo update, Dee Dee and Pat Miller explained that the check to pay for security was lost in the mail and a stop order was placed. Dee Dee paid online with her credit card, which caused the security fee to be slightly higher due to incurring a credit card charge fee. Two deputies have been hired to provide security for Expo. Wristbands for patrons entering Expo have arrived. More table top signs for the plant sales area have been purchased. We do have volunteers signed up for all of the various areas. Individuals who volunteered to be cashiers will need to download the Square app onto their phones to be used for credit card purchases. Instructions will be sent to those volunteers on how to get this set up. (Based on volunteers' experience from last year, this was very easy and worked really well). There will be tables with two volunteers at each to take money at the entrance. As of this time, there is no plan to go outside early to get the entrance fee from patrons standing in line to speed up the process. This will be revisited as necessary.

Jim Jeray updated the board on the flooding problems at the community garden. When the rain garden was removed from the parking lot during the construction of the new animal shelter, this has

most likely led to a higher amount of water to flow down the hill and pool near the tractor shed on the west side of the driveway that leads into the community gardens. The construction crew was made aware of the problem, and they indicated they will address the issue once the building is completed, sometime this summer. Jim also informed the board that an issue was discovered concerning the Squarespace platform that supports the master gardener website. A Google search on a member's name would pull up our entire list, which should be kept confidential to master gardener members only. Our webmaster Charles Kanitz has also been made aware of the issue also and is actively working on it.

Pat Williams is still waiting for quotes on the installation of a new base, still using the frame from the original extension office sign. Dee Dee has requested three different quotes on signs that would fit inside that frame to advertise the Master Gardener gardens. Once all of that information is obtained, the board will decide which is the best cost and location of a new sign for the gardens.

We received a request from RDM Farms, one of our Expo vendors, to have a booth and/or teach classes at their open house on their farm on Saturday, April 20th. Pat Williams agreed to teach the classes.

Jim Jeray asked for clarification about informational communications sent to individuals renting plots from us at the various community gardens. In the past, all communications have come from the extension office. Pat W. clarified that these communications should come directly from the community garden chairs to the community gardeners and not through the extension office. This topic was brought up in particular about the upcoming soil health program that will be held on Thursday, April 25th at the community garden.

Alison and Sally updated the board on the list of speakers they are managing for the monthly meetings. Almost all dates for 2024 are filled. Several ideas were discussed on how to still present a program when a speaker does not show up. This topic was deferred to the board retreat for further discussion. They both plan to continue to work on good communications with the speakers on time, date, and location of our monthly group meeting.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 7:51PM.

Treasurer's Report, March 2024

Income for the month of March was from dues, Garden Expo Vendor payments and interest for a total of \$124. Expenses for the month were for the social committee, Garden Expo and general items for a total of \$1,260. There was an increase in the Restricted Funds of \$10,000 for the Demo Garden Fund and a decrease in the Compost Project of \$17 for a net addition to the Restricted Funds of \$9,983. The Restricted Funds at month end were \$26,434. The bank balance was \$36,685 as of March 31 and the total of unrestricted funds available is \$10,251. The Savings Account balance was \$10,559 and the Gaming/Scholarship Account balance was \$767 at month end.

We are still in need of volunteers!

What a great time of year for gardeners and especially for us as part of the MGATC. APR 24, 1-3 pm, Moyer-Gould Mosey, NICHES/MGW

Dan Childs (wildflower enthusiast and author) leads a leisurely stroll along the 1-mile trail at this NICHES Carroll Co. nature preserve, where a wide variety of spring wildflowers abound! Dan's wildflower books will be available for purchase (check or Venmo).

MAY 1, 1-3 pm, An Introduction to the Woodland Sedges of Ross Hills Park, RHP

"Carex" is a genus of sedges often overlooked or misidentified despite being one of the most diverse plant genera in North America. IU researcher Rich Hull discusses his work at the park on a hike showcasing the identifying features of a variety of sedges and where you can normally find them.

MAY 8, 9-11 am, Spring on the Wing at Celery Bog, CBNA/LNC

Join Kyle Gebhart (West Lafayette Parks Naturalist) and members of the Sycamore Audubon Society for a hike on the Celery Bog trails to see both returning migrants and resident birds. Bring your binoculars. NOTE: IF RAINING, program will move indoors to Lilly Nature Center.

MAY 15, 1-3 pm, Exploring Hall Woods Nature Preserve (a moderate 1-mile hike), HWNP

Tom Swinford (Director of Stewardship, The Nature Conservancy) will share the unique ecology of this Putnam Co. nature preserve, consisting of rich oak woodlands & high-quality floodplains along Big Walnut Creek. Being part of the 3,500 acre Big Walnut Conservation Area makes site a magnet for migratory birds in the spring. Bring your binoculars.

MAY 22, 2:30-4:30 pm, Fire and Ice at Indiana Dunes National Park: A Hike through Miller Woods, IN-DUNES

Journey through a globally rare black oak savanna, around towering sand dunes, past interdunal wetlands, and along the shores of Lake Michigan on this hike through Miller Woods. Park Ranger Kip Walton (Outreach Coordinator, Indiana Dunes

National Park) will share the story of a landscape shaped by the forces of nature. Entrance FEE \$25/car OR free entry with National Park Pass. NOTE: 2:30-4:30pm EDT (1:30-3:30pmCDT in Gary). Bring binoculars.

MAY 29, 1-3 pm, Legislation & Stewardship: A Guided Hike at Laura Hare Bend of the Wabash East. NICHES/GSB

NICHES Land Trust staff and State Senator Spencer Derry lead a hike through the Laura Hare Bend of the Wabash East property, weaving the interconnectedness of legislative and environmental preservation. NICHES staff will highlight the ongoing restoration of this site and Senator Derry will discuss legislation aimed at large water withdrawals proposed in the region.



May Garden To-Do List

- Deadhead daffodils, tulips and other spring bulbs to prevent seed formation and allow bulbs to regain their flowering strength for next spring.
- Place plant supports this month around perennial plants after spring bulbs are finished blooming but before you remove the foliage to avoid spearing bulbs.
- Sharpen mower blades. Set mower high.
- Prune early spring-flowering shrubs and trees after they bloom.
- Start to harvest early leaf crops, radishes and asparagus.
- Harden off warm season flowers and vegetables that were started indoors.
- Plant warm season flowers and vegetables when the soil warms up and all danger of frost is past.
