An excellent source is the green Membership Directory. It contains the names and contact information of all officers and project chairs. It also shows which projects need a leader. Other volunteer opportunities are listed along with some suggestions for education hours.

The website has a wealth of information. To access the home page, enter "MGATC" in your browser. Then click on FOR MEMBERS. You will see a screen asking for a password. Where is that password? – on page 2 of the green book.

Upon entering the password, you arrive at the Members Page. The third paragraph has a direct link to the Purdue hours entry page. Right below that find **Forms**, which contains: membership form, reimbursement form and the Indiana state tax exempt forms for six local stores along with a number of less-used forms.

Returning to the MGATC Members Page, it has links to many important pieces of information. Under **Organization** find: member list, officers, projects and outstanding master gardener awards (all as found in the green book), plus the stored history of our bylaws.

Further down the page is the link to the **Garden Beet** monthly newsletter archive. That link takes you to the current issue and all past newsletters going back 30 years.

Below that under **Financial** are copies of our leases with the county as well as current and past budgets. Most of what is on the Members Page is up to date thanks to Charles, but expect minor changes as we enter the new year.

Finally, questions about the Purdue Extension Master Gardener Program such as certification levels, lapse in volunteer activity, rules for becoming an alumni MG, how to transfer to another county and many more are answered in the Policy Guide. Where is that Policy Guide? – A link is provided on the **Forms** page where it reads "**Program Policy Guide** can be found <u>HERE</u>."

We hope knowing where to find all this information will be helpful, saving you time and aggravation.

MGATC Meeting Minutes: October 3, 2023, TCEO

This was MGATC's annual Hoedown meeting. Following a wonderful carry-in dinner, the meeting was called to order by Co-President Mickey Penrod at 6:43 p.m.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the September 5, 2023, monthly meeting minutes as posted in the October 2023 issue of the *Garden Beet*.

The Treasurer's Report was given by Co-President Jim Jeray as Treasurer Deb Rimer was not in attendance. He reviewed the income and expenses for the month and noted that the ending bank balance was \$35,088.49 of which \$19,303.87 is in unrestricted funds.

Five members of the current Master Gardener class were recognized and welcomed to the meeting.

Mickey Penrod brought her copy of the AAS binder to the meeting and passed it around for everyone to see. It contained all of the competition information, including photographs and competition guidelines. MGATC's entry has been submitted; however, no results have been posted as yet.

It was announced that volunteers are needed to help with the new class on Saturdays, both mornings and afternoons. A sign-up sheet is at the greeter's table or volunteers can sign up through Sign-Up Genius.

A motion was made, seconded and carried to adjourn the business portion of the meeting at 6:50 p.m.

Co-Vice President Cheryl McCool then introduced the speakers for the evening.

Alison Roth's slide-show presentation was on the

Master Gardener "Orchard." She reviewed all of the work that has been done in the orchard this year, including 1) planting new plants; 2) pruning existing plants; 3) reviewing how all of the plants did this year; and, 4) discussing goals for 2024. The Treasurer's Report was given by Treasurer Deb Rimer. She reviewed the income and expenses for the month and noted that the ending bank balance was \$35,088.49 of which \$19,303.87 is in unrestricted funds. The savings account balance was \$10,557.53 and the gaming account balance was \$767.00. The current year-to-date expense balance is \$7,109.79, however, more expenses are expected to be submitted.

Also at the November monthly meeting, the slate of officers will be presented, with the election of officers being held at the December monthly meeting.

Jim Jeray reported that Lawn & Shrub will be turning off the water at the Extension gardens on November 6.

The Board agreed to participate in the Trunk or Treat program, noting that it was not necessary to bring this to the Board each year. The event will be held at the Tippecanoe County Fairgrounds, West Pavilion, on Thursday, October 26 beginning at 6:00 p.m. Dee Dee Long will set up a Sign-Up Genius email to get volunteers. A motion was made, seconded and carried to allow Dee Dee Long a \$200 budget to purchase candy for this event.

The Board discussed the topic of Expo donations. It was reiterated that we will not accept donated plants

from persons who are not Master Gardeners as we do not know what we are getting. We need to be careful as we have our reputation in the community to uphold and do not want to take a chance on selling plants which are diseased.

Jolaine Roberts arrived.

The Trellis and Vine Program will be set up this year with the new class. The class ends soon so we need to move forward on this. Dee Dee Long will send out a mass email asking for volunteers to be a trellises to work with the new class.

Mickey Penrod announced that MGATC placed Third in the AAS Selection Competition. The Board congratulated her on a job well done. She reported that she signed a Letter of Intent for next year. However, she will no longer be Chair of the AAS gardens. She gave them Pat Williams' contact information in the event that we can find someone else to take over the program.

In regard to the purchase of a push mover to support the gardens, Mickey Penrod reported that she is still shopping.

November Garden To-Do List

- Give houseplants adequate light & humidity.
- Plant spring bulbs when soil temperature is 55° or less.
- Apply animal repellent over spring bulbs such as tulips and crocus, and on trees, shrubs, and evergreens if needed.
- Start bulbs for forcing. Keep tender bulbs like paperwhites in warm or slightly cool indoor temperatures.
- Harvest late season leafy greens and Brussels sprouts. Carrots can stay in the ground a while longer if thick mulch is applied to keep the ground from freezing.
- Wait to mulch tender plants and roses until ground is frozen (usually in late November or early December).
- November is still a good time to plant trees & shrubs.
- Deeply water trees and shrubs, especially new ones, before the ground freezes..
- Disconnect garden hoses before freezing temperatures.
- Keep mulch away from base of trees and shrubs to discourage bark-chewing voles.
- Cut lawn grass if needed at usual height. Tall grass can be prone to snow mold.
- Do final garden cleanup. Compost leaves and debris. Turn the compost pile.
- Clean up all dropped fruit below fruit trees.
